Because of the ongoing pandemic and constantly changing regulations, the groups will continue to meet online during the winter term. This winter term, Angelika Zirker will be offering an online course on "The Theory and Practice of Annotation: Philology and the Digital Humanities". The corpus for annotation will be Charles Dickens's *The Chimes* (1844). It is open for the DH Profile in the various MA programmes at the Faculty of Humanities as well as all philology students of Tübingen University that have concluded their advanced module in literary and/or cultural studies of the English Seminar.
